Originally a calm meeting on Albertov which should have commemorated the events from the year 1939 turned into a demonstration against the regime. This led to the brutal suppression of students by the security service. This crucial moment started the Velvet revolution, which transformed totalitarian Czechoslovakia into a democratic country.

Let's pay tribute to all who fought for our freedom and finally won.
